## **Worship in March Sunday Worship is at 10:30 a.m.**

### **March 4<sup>th</sup> - Ten Commandments Exodus 20:1-17**

What do the Ten Commandments offer to us today? Can we see in them a way to structure life? Communion will be celebrated this Sunday.

### **March 11 - Temptation of Jesus Matthew 4:1-11**

Our church school children and youth will present this scripture lesson during worship. How do we deal with temptation?

### **March 18 - Special Guest**

We will be hosting guest preacher this Sunday for one of our sister's churches. This is an important part of covenant with the United Church of Christ and having as many people for worship that Sunday is helpful to the guest preacher.

### **March 25, 2018 - Palm and Passion Sunday A Holy Week Walk**

Our worship on this Sunday will begin with a Palm Sunday parade, including cheers and song. Worship will then help us move through the events of Holy Week with Jesus. We will remember his teaching, being anointed, celebrating the Last Supper, washing the feet of the disciples, praying in the garden, his arrest and trial, and end with his walk to the cross.

There will be many participants in the service, including children and youth. There will be no church school this Sunday as families are encouraged to worship together.

### **March 29<sup>th</sup> - Holy Thursday worship at 7 p.m.**

Gather around the table with Jesus and his disciples to remember the Last Supper. Worship will bring us to the table as well. This holy evening is a time to pause before Easter and remember this most sacred moment. Worship will be in the sanctuary.

## **March 30<sup>th</sup> Good Friday - Community Service at Noon at Hope Reformed Church**

The seven last words of Jesus on the cross will be the focus of this service. Pastors and leaders of seven different churches in South Haven will each speak on these words (4-5 minutes each). Pastor Dick will be one of the speakers. All are welcome.

### **April 1<sup>st</sup> Easter Sunday Worship - No Fooling!**

*"For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God."*  
-1 Corinthians 1:18

The custom of Holy Humor around Easter, is rooted in the musings of early church theologians (like Augustine, Gregory of Nyssa, and John Chrysostom) that God played a practical joke on the devil by raising Jesus from the dead. "Risus paschalis - the Easter laugh," the early theologians called it.

How appropriate then that Easter falls on April Fool's Day this year. All silliness aside, worship will be at 10:30 a.m. on Easter Sunday.

Come, to sing, to rejoice, to laugh and smile. Let the light shine and smell the aroma of Spring. Put on your Easter bonnets and come gather to celebrate what the Lord has done. Easter is the defining element of the Christian Faith. It is a time for great joy and singing.



## A Changing Sign for Changing Times

The Lenten Offering this year goes to help underwrite installation of a new electronic sign on Phoenix Street! The Trustees have approved the project, plans are being coordinated with the city, and we already have received special funding designated for the new sign!

But why do we need a new sign? The short answer is: Weather and Time. Both negatively impact the changing of messages.

Take weather. Seasons change. Rain, snow and winds blow. Heat and cold take their toll. Locks freeze, hinges wear and fail, open plexiglass panels catch gusts when changing the letters, thereby banging heads, smashing fingers, chilling initiative and inflaming tempers! Many times inclement weather simply means new messages don't get posted.

Time becomes a double-edged sword - impacting both the ease of changing messages and the speed between message changes. First Congregational is an active church. We have ongoing weekly events such as Sunday Worship, M-W-F Food Pantry, and Thursday night suppers in Winter. But we also host a variety of other activities: special worship events such as Ash Wednesday and Good Friday services during Lent, Scouts and scouting events like the recent Pinewood Derby, Youth Lock-Ins, AAUW's book sale, Garden Club events, the Holiday Bazaar and annual Church rummage sales, ecumenical interchurch Worship events, and of course weddings and funerals. Many of these frequently occur on the same day, or sometimes arrive with short lead times. Often there's not enough time to quickly create, post and change many important time-sensitive messages manually, letter by letter. Especially in bad weather.

Meanwhile, the success of our ministries and breadth of our activities create the need for a variety of vital new messages! Imagine the possibilities. Imagine for a moment you cre-

ate a weekly Sunday Worship message once, and then post, remove and re-post it again... at the push of a button. Imagine you create a series of special event messages days or weeks in advance when your schedule is slow, and store them on computer until needed for posting. Imagine using color or graphics to increase the impact of your message. Imagine being able to change messages in inclement weather without having to venture out into it! Finally, imagine making all these possibilities come true through your generosity this Lenten season.



The new sign will help us better communicate with our South Haven and surrounding community. We are currently reviewing legal, technical and aesthetic requirements with the city. Results will help us finalize functional and budg-

etary parameters so we can send specifications out for bid. We hope to do so soon! Preliminary estimates currently range between \$8,500 - \$14,000 depending upon final specifications.

Our Lenten offering runs from Sunday February 18<sup>th</sup> through Good Friday March 30<sup>th</sup>. Special offering envelopes are available in each pew.

February 12, 2018

Dear Mr. Murphey:
