Easter

On April 9, we will once again celebrate the mystery of the resurrection. I marvel every year about the events leading up to that week. I wonder where I would have stood in the crowd. Years ago, I was part of a church that did a Passion Play for the whole town, big production numbers, soaring solos, moving death at the cross. I was part of the crowd/chorus, given a bit part to play. I stood on the side of the street waving a palm branch, and then a few scenes later

stood in the crowd shouting for Barabbas to be freed and to crucify Jesus. It was strange and a bit frightening to night after night be a part of the crowd swayed by mob mentality, both in joy and in anger. Where would I stand if Jesus rode in to town today?

The events in the final week of Jesus life are overwhelming when compressed into a few hours of worship; hours for us to experience all of the events told in our gospels. There was the triumph as Jesus entered the city to waving branches and shouts of adoration, a friend's betrayal after supper, anguished prayer in a garden, an arrest, a brutal beat-



ing, and the final journey to the cross. I read it each year and always wonder where would I have stood those many years ago, where do I stand today?

The authorities were through with Jesus' disruptions to their system of power, his defiance with temple authorities was upsetting the people, they feared his puzzling words of a heavenly realm here on earth that they could not control.

Today we at times do not want our lives disrupted by the realm that Jesus spoke of. Giving to the food pantry is easy (and so needed), but can we move beyond that to help end the social and political systems that keep people in poverty and hunger? Will we volunteer our time and effort to creating heaven here by loving as Jesus did, radically-with all we are and all we have? Will we stand with those who wave branches and signs and shout hosanna, change is needed- blessed is he who comes in the name of the lord? That title 'the one who comes in the name of the lord' does not just belong to Jesus- we too are the ones who come in the name of the lord. When we care for the widow, shelter the homeless, feed the hungry, educate the

children, provide health care that is affordable, contact our representatives at the State and federal level with words of concern and compassion; we too come in the name of the lord.

"Let the Word of Christthe Message-have the run of the house. Give it plenty of room in your

lives. Instruct and direct one another using good common sense. And sing, sing your hearts out to God! *Let every detail in your lives–words, actions, whatever–*be done in the name of the Master, Jesus, thanking God every step of the way. Colossians 3:16-17 (The Message)

Let every detail in your lives be done in the name of The Master. Choose, which crowd will you stand with?

We'll pack and haul beginning at 3 p.m.

You may bring your items on Thursday, April 13, Friday, April 14, and Monday, April 17th, all during church hours of 9:30-1:30 p.m. If you have access at other times, feel free to bring your items in. <u>REMEMBER</u>: You need to set items on the appropriate table/area and UNPACK. Tables will be labeled.

We no longer have the help to move stuff around, which also means, NO EARLY DELIV-

ERIES. The exception to that are large items like furniture, which may be put in the office hallway, or the lower level hallway.

Staging and arranging will take place on Tuesday, April 18th, from 9-3 p.m. VOLUNTEERS are needed that day. Since donations will be presorted, it should go quickly. *Only big tickets items will be priced.*

Three cashiers and a few aisle managers are needed for Wednesday and Thursday. Check out is by the bundle.

After the sale packers and haulers are needed at 3 p.m. on that Thursday.

PLEASE:

- \Rightarrow Place your items in the designated areas. Avoid under the tables if possible.
- \Rightarrow Bundle, tie, tape, package, pin items, pairs, and sets that go together.
- \Rightarrow Label linen sizes or shapes and bundle together.
- \Rightarrow CLEAN, DRY, functioning items only.
- \Rightarrow Only <u>decorative</u> picture frames seem to sell.
- \Rightarrow Large items in office hallway or lower level hallway.
- \Rightarrow Plants, and starts, sell VERY well.

Limit of 2 (two) containers of clothing per family. If items are bulky does not count towards your two limit.

Any containers left should be labeled if you wish them returned.
