Young Adult Ministry





Doers of the Word

The book of James is a General Epistle. Scholars differ on who James was. Some offer that he was the half-brother of Jesus. The letter was written approximately 48-49 A.D.

The key personalities of this book are James and Persecuted Christians. James wrote this book to Jewish believers to encourage them to endure and live bold Christian lives. James is a book about practical Christian living that reflects a genuine faith that transforms lives.

Two other notes: In chapter 1, James teaches believers to test their faith and "prove yourselves doers of the word" (1:22). James encourages believers to put their faith into action, and to be servants of Jesus Christ.

Then, in chapters 2-3, James describes the relationship between faith and works. He teaches that a person of faith without works demonstrates useless faith. What good is a person's faith if they don't present it to the world? A believer's good works are evidence of their faith in Jesus Christ.

Dear Friends,

On July 7th, news of the assassination of the Haitian President, Jovenel Moise, sent shockwaves throughout Haiti and abroad. This is part of a long running political and social crisis that has plummeted Haiti into further instability, insecurity, and poverty. About one month later, a Magnitude 7.2 earthquake rocked the southwest region of the country. The death toll is still unknown, but will likely be several thousand, including countless injuries and loss of livelihood. In the face of such calamities and disasters, it is only natural to fall into despair and hopelessness. Perhaps one may even succumb to the myth that Haiti is cursed. We would like to remind you that we are not living only by the natural order of things; we have faith and hope in God, the Maker of heaven and earth.

By the Grace of God, The Good Shepherd Orphanage has been sheltered from this earthquake. Though the ground shakes were heavily felt, no damage was done here. However, our farm at Duparc, located about 30 miles from the earthquake epicenter, has seen some damages. The fence wall near the church building was destroyed, and another building's roof was damaged. We thank God that none of our staff members got hurt. Repairs will cost around \$5,000. Even before this earthquake, the last three months have been very difficult for us. We can hear the gunshots of fighting gangs not far from the orphanage every day. Various armed gangs have taken control of the only road from downtown Port-au-Prince to Carrefour where the orphanage is. This prevents us from travelling in any direction when we need to. It is nearly impossible to find food and all other kinds of items because we have to drive to downtown Port Au Prince to buy most goods. Nearly all the food stores and other stores in our area are out of stock since they also cannot go to Port Au Prince to restock. This has contributed to an increase in food insecurity. We experience this need daily as more people come to the orphanage for the feeding program.

Fortunately, thanks to God's provision and your generous donations in the past, we recently shipped a food container to the orphanage. The goal is to use that food to feed as many people as possible since food insecurity has reached an alarming level in our community. In addition to feeding the children and staff, we share the blessing of these precious food resources with the families around the orphanage. As such, your donations for

food have a significant impact in the community. Because of the scarcity of food, we would like to secure funding for another food shipment soon. With the accelerated pace of the needs, the food container may only last six to ten months. Please consider donating toward a food shipment to the orphanage. We need to raise \$10,000 for this need.

This year has been particularly tough for our kids at the orphanage. The long and unpredictable disruptions of their schooling due to kidnappings and insecurity has caused them to lose about three months of school this year. The school exam success rate this year has dropped to 80% from nearly 100% last year. On a good note, the kids have had a lot of time to engage in farming activities at the orphanage. The Lord has blessed the land so wonderfully that we have been able to produce all kinds of crops (sweet potatoes, plantains, corn, etc.). The harvest was so plentiful that we even sold some of the produce at the neighborhood market! We are also happy to announce that we have welcomed a new child to the orphanage. Jameson Guillaume is a 9 year old boy who has lost both parents within a two year period. He has never attended school before and is excited to join our family.

The people of Haiti are literally living in the valley of the shadow of death, but there is a remnant there that will fear no evil for God is with them. As many families in Haiti mourn the loss of their loved ones, we invite you to mourn with them, pray with them, and hope with them that God will bring consolation, restoration, and peace to that nation. This message is mainly to encourage you to pray for Haiti. Pray that God would raise up people who know Him to positions of power to do His will here in this land.
